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provide a written report to the congressional defense com-1 2 mittees describing the execution of funds provided in this title, including the amounts obligated and expended, in 3 total and since the previous report; the nature of the costs 4 5 incurred or services provided by such funds; and any reimbursements or funds transferred by another Federal agen-6 7 cy to the Department of Defense which relates to the pur-8 pose of the funds provided by this title. 9 SEC. 1102. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, funds provided by this title shall only be for the pur-10 11 poses specified, and shall not be subject to any transfer

1 SEC. 1502. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond 2 3 the current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein. 4 SEC. 1503. Unless otherwise provided for by this Act, the additional amounts appropriated by this Act to appro-5 priations accounts shall be available under the authorities 6 7 and conditions applicable to such appropriations accounts 8 for fiscal year 2022.

9 SEC. 1504. Each amount provided by this division is 10 designated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-11 quirement pursuant to section 4001(a)(1) and section 12 4001(b) of S. Con. Res. 14 (117th Congress), the concur-13 rent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2022.

14 SEC. 1505. Not later than January 15, 2022, the Di-15 rector of the Office of Management and Budget shall provide to the Committees on Appropriations of the House 16 17 of Representatives and the Senate a written report on Op-18 eration Allies Welcome: *Provided*, That such report shall describe the strategy and transition plan leading to the 19 conclusion of Operation Allies Welcome; a plan, including 20 21 timeline, for relocating all Afghans currently residing at 22 Department of Defense facilities to longer-term housing; 23 the activities and responsibilities assigned to each Federal 24 agency involved in such strategy and transition plan; and
