I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Speaker Mike Johnson made sweeping promises to secure the gavel—vowing that he would allow more deliberation and debate, follow regular order, empower Members of Congress to make their voices heard, and bring big, important ideas up for debate on the floor of the United States House of Representatives. Sadly, under his leadership, the House Republican Majority has done the exact opposite. Instead of encouraging debate, they have stifled it.

Rules Committee Republicans have issued a whopping 168 closed rules during Speaker Johnson’s tenure overall—over 70% of all rules issued. In just the first year of the 119th Congress, 95 measures have been issued a closed rule. In other words, on more than 4 out of 5 measures during the 119th Congress, Members of

Congress—Democratic and Republican alike—are forced to take an up-or-down vote with no option to amend legislation.

After shattering their own record for the most closed Congress with 115 closed rules in the 118th Congress, Republicans are on track to blow that record out of the water by the conclusion of the 119th Congress as they rig the rules to further shut down debate. Their heavy-handed approach has all but eliminated actual deliberation in the House, illustrated by the over 6,000 blocked amendments during Johnson's tenure. An unprecedented seven of every ten amendment ideas submitted to the Rules Committee have been blocked, silencing the voices of hundreds of millions of Americans.

Most Republican amendments and nearly two-thirds of bipartisan amendment ideas have been blocked by the Rules Committee during Johnson's tenure. Fearful of debate, Republican Leadership has weaponized the legislative process to block amendments from even being considered on the House floor.

In short, Speaker Johnson and House Republicans have weaponized the Rules Committee to protect President Trump and ensure the House is merely a rubber stamp on his agenda—with no real deliberation, discussion, or debate. As a result, Republicans set a record for the fewest House votes cast in the first session of a two-year Congress in over 35 years.<sup>1</sup>

Instead of operating independently as the first branch of government, as the founders intended, Speaker Johnson and House Republicans have abdicated their constitutional obligations to appease a lawless Administration and a president who displays open scorn for the very foundations of our democratic republic.

In fact, even President Trump's allies now compare this body to the Russian Duma—a legislature in name only that exists not to further democratic governance, but to rubber stamp power.<sup>2</sup>

Americans deserve a government that works for them—and a Congress that is unafraid to debate ideas, consider amendments, vote on issues, and boldly address the pressing challenges we face. Grocery bills are rising. Healthcare costs are exploding. Millions of Americans are one paycheck away from missing rent, being forced to skip meals, or getting the heat turned off.

Yet time after time, Republicans block deliberation on common-sense amendments to address the real issues that people care

about. They are not just shutting down debate, they are doing it to serve greedy corporations and the billionaire class instead of the hardworking Americans who sent us here to fight for them.

This report, *How Donald Trump Stole Congress*, should serve as a warning of the increasingly authoritarian tactics used by a House Republican Majority that sees itself as an arm of the White House. It represents the culmination of months of intensive research to uncover and expose the extent to which Republican Leadership is willing to shred the institutional norms that have helped Congress function for two and a half centuries.

Instead of shutting down debate, Democrats believe that deliberation and discussion—in full view of the American people—is a good thing. We believe in democracy. We believe in making millionaires and billionaires pay what they owe. We believe in lowering costs for working Americans. We are determined to build an economy that works for everyone, not just the rich and powerful.

This Democratic vision is not just empty rhetoric; it is seen through the amendments and motions that Democrats on the Rules Committee have advocated for throughout Speaker Mike Johnson’s tenure. Were those amendments voted on by the House, perhaps some of them would have passed. The American people need deliberation to be restored to the People’s House. It is the only way Congress can truly work for them.

## II. DOUBLING DOWN ON THE MOST CLOSED CONGRESS IN HISTORY

Speaker Johnson rose to power after far-right Republicans ousted Speaker McCarthy nine months into the 118th Congress, in part due to McCarthy’s failure to open up the legislative process. In announcing his candidacy for the speakership, Johnson wrote that the top priority of a new Speaker should be to:

*“Restore trust by ensuring total transparency, open processes, and regular order.”<sup>3</sup>*

After Speaker Johnson won the confidence of House Republicans, he announced to the entire body:

*“[...] this Speaker’s Office is going to be known for decentralizing the power here. My office is going to be known for **Members being more involved and having more influence in our processes and all the major decisions that are made here, for predictable processes, and regular order.** We owe that to the people.”<sup>4</sup>*

Yet, looking back on his first two years as Speaker, it is evident Speaker Johnson has done the exact opposite.

Despite his promise of regular order, the Rules Committee has met on dozens of measures that did not go through regular order. Despite a promise of open process, there have been a record-setting number of closed rules and blocked amendments under Speaker Johnson’s leadership. Despite promising transparency, Speaker Johnson has used the Rules Committee to block transparency at every turn.

The Rules Committee uses “special rules” to structure debate on the House floor. Different types of special rules allow for either more (or less) debate of amendments to legislation being considered on the House floor.

Closed rules block all amendments from being considered by the House. This creates a take-it-or-leave-it approach to legislation being considered. To be clear: closed rules are not inherently bad. They can and are used by both parties to streamline debate or expedite consideration of carefully crafted compromise legislation.

**Yet the seismic shift toward closed rules that has happened under Speaker Mike Johnson and this Republican Majority is truly unprecedented in its magnitude.**


At the conclusion of the 118th Congress, House Republicans had issued 115 closed rules, shattering their own previous record for the most closed Congress in history.<sup>5</sup> 73 of those rules were reported after Mike Johnson was elected Speaker, despite his promises of “open processes, and regular order.”

So far in the first year of the 119th Congress, a staggering 84% of the rules issued by Republicans have been closed, meaning the vast majority of bills considered by the House under a special rule are unamendable on the floor by minority or majority party Members. In total, 95 measures have been issued a closed rule, putting Republicans on track to far surpass their previous record of most closed rules in a single Congress.




Already, this Republican majority has set a new record for the most closed rules in a single year—a 40% increase from the previous record.

A key impact of shutting down debate is that the Rules Committee has become a graveyard for amendment ideas—Democratic, Republican, and bipartisan alike.

During Speaker Johnson’s tenure, Rules Republicans have blocked from consideration over 6,000 amendments, including 89% of Democratic amendments, 54% of Republican amendments, and 64% of bipartisan amendments. It took Rules Republicans until

mid-June of the first session of the 119th Congress to make a single bipartisan amendment debatable on the House floor. The American people are eager for us to work across the aisle, yet House Republicans are shutting out bipartisan ideas before they even have a chance to be debated.


When the majority intends to issue a closed rule, they do not solicit amendments from Members. In contrast, when the Committee plans to make amendments in order, the majority sends out a “call for amendments” that sets a deadline for amendment submissions and contains technical instructions for drafting amendment text. So while Republicans have *explicitly* blocked thousands of amendment ideas, they have *discouraged* thousands more by not sending out a call for amendments for an incredible 85% of the measures considered by the Rules Committee in the 119th Congress.



Further deterring Members from submitting amendments is the widespread—and justified—belief that the amendments will be blocked regardless. In the 119th Congress so far, nearly 80% of amendments have been blocked, up from 61% in the 115th Congress and nearly 70% in the 118th Congress during the previous two Republican majorities. In contrast, when Democrats were in charge in the 116th and 117th Congresses, nearly half of all

amendments submitted to the Rules Committee were made in order.

The longer Republicans are in charge of the House of Representatives, the less debate they allow and the more they turn Congress into a rubber stamp for Donald Trump's billionaires-first agenda.



In total, Rules Republicans have blocked 72% of amendments submitted to the Committee since Mike Johnson took over as Speaker. In fact, Speaker Johnson and Rules Republicans have blocked nearly as many amendments in two years as Democrats did over four years. The true number, of course, is much higher since amendment submissions are consistently suppressed since the Committee does not solicit amendment submissions on the vast majority of bills it considers.

It is important to remember that amendments represent ideas from Members of Congress who are elected to fight on behalf of the people who they represent. It is crucial that as many of these ideas as possible are considered and debated on the House floor.

In recent months, Speaker Johnson moved from blocking debate through an abuse of closed rules to simply shutting down the House when difficult issues arise. In the 118th Congress, Republican

Leadership canceled 26 voting days.<sup>6</sup> So far, Speaker Johnson has canceled 35 voting days throughout the first year of the 119th Congress. In other words, Republican Leadership canceled a quarter of voting days this year despite the longest government shutdown in American history. By the end of the year, House Republicans set the record for fewest votes cast in the chamber in the first session of a Congress since at least 1989.<sup>7</sup>

**The clear result of this authoritarian speakership has been a level of rank-and-file Member rebellion that is unprecedented in recent decades.**

Frustrated at their leadership for blocking their ideas from coming to the floor, Republican Members have joined with Democrats to defeat special rules and use discharge petitions as an end-run around Republican Leadership.

Special rules have been defeated nine times under the current Republican majority—three under Speaker McCarthy,<sup>8</sup> and six under Speaker Johnson<sup>9</sup>—giving the 118th Congress the worst rule vote record in half a century.<sup>10</sup> In fact, failed rules were completely unheard of in recent decades. Before the 118th Congress, the last special rule to be defeated was over 20 years prior.<sup>11</sup> Other special rules this Congress were on the precipice of defeat only to be adopted after Republican Leadership was forced to make backroom deals during the rule vote to buy their own Members' votes.<sup>12</sup>

Successful discharge petitions, once an extraordinary occurrence, have become almost commonplace. In the last 30 years, eight discharge petitions have reached the 218-signature threshold.<sup>13</sup> Six of those eight have been under Speaker Johnson—

and three of them in the final two months of this session. In a clear illustration of rank-and-file frustration with closed rules, four Republicans signed the discharge petition to extend the Affordable Care Act's enhanced premium tax credits only after the Rules Committee blocked all Republican amendments on the topic.<sup>14</sup>

### III. SHUTTING DOWN THE PROCESS ON POLICIES AMERICANS CARE ABOUT

This section provides just a few examples of the thousands of amendments Rules Republicans have blocked on issues that the American people—regardless of political affiliation—care about.<sup>15</sup>

The extent to which Rules Republicans, under Speaker Johnson's leadership, have shut down debate is truly staggering. Republican Leadership has blocked debate on thousands of amendments over the past few years, the inevitable result of which is a less deliberative process and up-or-down votes on legislation that fails to reflect the needs of the American people.

#### A. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *MAKING THE WEALTHY PAY THEIR FAIR SHARE*

**Providing Tax Breaks for the Majority of Americans:** Representative *Lloyd Doggett* (D-TX) introduced an amendment (#250) to H.R. 1 that would have protected tax relief for Americans earning less than \$400,000 per year, while preventing excessive tax breaks for higher-income earners. This would have cut the cost of the Big Ugly Bill to the American taxpayer by roughly half.

Republicans blocked this amendment and instead wasted over a trillion dollars on tax cuts for millionaires and billionaires.<sup>16</sup>

**Preventing Tax Cuts for the Ultra-Wealthy:** Amendment #83 to the Senate Amendment to H.R. 1, introduced by Representative *Judy Chu* (D-CA) would have prohibited additional tax cuts for anyone making over \$10 million per year. The Republican majority blocked this amendment, aligning themselves with the ultrarich instead of hardworking Americans.

**Minimum Income Tax for Billionaires:** Rules Republicans blocked amendment #269 to H.R. 1 and #474 to the Senate Amendment to H.R. 1, both sponsored by Representative *Teresa Leger Fernández* (D-NM). Amendment #269 would have established a minimum income tax for billionaires. Amendment #474 would have raised the top marginal tax rate from 37% to 39.6%. Republicans refused to even consider raising taxes on the wealthiest Americans despite multiple efforts by Democrats to do so, resulting in a Republican reconciliation bill that will add more than \$4 trillion to the national debt when accounting for interest.<sup>17</sup>

**Preventing Tax Evasion by the Wealthiest Americans:** Representative *Lloyd Doggett* (D-TX) offered amendment #54 to H.R. 4820 (118th Congress) and amendment #34 to H.R. 4664 (118th Congress), both of which would have restored funding to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) in order to go after tax cheats and reduce high-income tax evasion. This funding would have maintained key IRS enforcement and operational activities to ensure that the ultra-wealthy, like President Trump and his family, comply with the tax code and pay their fair share.

**Enabling Free Access to Tax Filing Software:** Amendment #142 to H.R. 4664 (118th Congress), sponsored by Representative *Lloyd Doggett* (D-TX), and co-sponsored by Representatives *Beyer* (D-VA) and *Porter* (D-CA), would have protected access to free tax filing software. The IRS should have a free and public electronic-filing service option for taxpayers to file their annual tax return.

Unfortunately, Republicans gutted this program while preventing the House from considering even voting to protect it.

B. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *EXTENDING THE ACA'S ENHANCED PREMIUM TAX CREDITS*

**Extending ACA Premium Tax Credits That Keep Healthcare Affordable:** Amendment #192 to the Senate Amendment to H.R. 1, offered by Representative *Lauren Underwood* (D-IL), would have made the enhanced ACA tax credits permanent. In 2025, more than 24 million people are enrolled in ACA marketplace plans and over 90% receive the premium tax credit.<sup>18</sup> These tax credits directly lower the price Americans pay on their health premiums. Republican Leadership spent months refusing to negotiate, debate, or vote on the ACA tax credits, ultimately letting them expire.

**Permanently Extending the ACA Enhanced Premium Tax Credits:** Amendment #50 to the Senate Amendment to H.R. 5371, offered by Representative *Emily Randall* (D-WA), would have made the enhanced ACA tax credits permanent. Since their inception, these credits have reduced ACA marketplace enrollees' premiums by an average of \$800 per year, making health care more affordable and accessible for millions of Americans.<sup>19</sup> Republican Leadership blocked this amendment despite rising healthcare costs, and presented no plan for extending these vital working- and middle-class tax credits.

**Extending the ACA Enhanced Premium Tax Credits for Three Years:** Amendment #70 to the Senate Amendment to H.R. 5371, offered by Minority Leader *Hakeem Jeffries* (D-NY), would have extended the enhanced ACA tax credits for three years. Rules Republicans also blocked this amendment, effectively guaranteeing that millions would lose access to affordable health coverage in the new year. In a rare break with party leadership, several moderate

Republicans later signed onto this proposal through a discharge petition after Speaker Johnson prevented a vote on an extension. The discharge petition is set for a vote in January 2026.

**Republican Efforts to Extend the ACA Enhanced Premium Tax Credits:** Amendments #13, 17, and 23-24 to H.R. 6703, sponsored by Representatives *Brian Fitzpatrick* (R-PA), *Jennifer Kiggans* (R-VA), and *Nick LaLota* (R-NY), respectively, would all have extended the expiring ACA enhanced Premium Tax Credits. Without an extension, health insurance premiums will skyrocket for over 20 million Americans. Despite Speaker Johnson initially indicating he would work with moderate Republicans to make in order an amendment extending the tax credits, the Rules Committee blocked all such amendments from receiving votes on the floor.<sup>20</sup>

#### C. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *MEDICAID AND HEALTHCARE ACCESS*

**Preventing Billionaires from Receiving Tax Cuts in Exchange for Cuts to Medicaid:** Amendment #53 to H. Con. Res. 14, offered by Representative *Adam Gray* (D-CA), would have prevented Republicans from giving tax cuts to billionaires if they cut Medicaid at all. President Trump promised the American people that he would not cut Medicaid—yet his signature law does just that.<sup>21</sup> Instead of taxing billionaires fairly, Republicans slashed critical funding for healthcare and other social safety net programs and put the money straight into the pockets of America’s wealthiest individuals.

**Preventing Cuts to the Affordable Care Act:** Republicans blocked amendment #167 to the Senate Amendment to H.R. 1, offered by Representative *Judy Chu* (D-CA), which would have struck the parts of the Republican bill that would make healthcare more expensive for individuals who get coverage on the Affordable Care Act (ACA) marketplace. Cuts to Medicaid and the ACA are

resulting in a loss of healthcare coverage for roughly 15 million Americans.<sup>22</sup> In the richest country in the world, Republicans are forcing Americans to choose between healthcare and other fundamental necessities.

**Ensuring Healthcare for Children and Pregnant Women:** Amendment #242 to H.R. 1, sponsored by Representative *Jimmy Gomez* (D-CA) and cosponsored by Representative *Pelosi* (D-CA), would have extended eligibility for the ACA premium tax credit to include children and pregnant women. Democrats have long advocated for increased healthcare coverage for all Americans and work tirelessly to enhance its affordability. Pregnant women and children deserve to have their healthcare access protected, yet Rules Republicans were unwilling to let the chamber even debate the issue.

**Preventing Rural Hospital Closures:** Bipartisan amendment #114 to H.R. 5894 (118th Congress), offered by Representative *Don Davis* (D-NC) and cosponsored by Representative *Murphy* (R-NC), would have increased funding for small rural hospitals by \$5 million. Even prior to the Big Ugly Bill gutting rural healthcare, Republicans were blocking bipartisan amendments that would have helped rural hospitals.

#### D. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *JOBS AND THE ECONOMY*

**Increasing Job Opportunities for Military Spouses:** Bipartisan amendment #1058 to H.R. 8070 (118th Congress), led by Representatives *Robin Kelly* (D-IL) and *Tony Gonzales* (R-TX), would have established a spouse-specific Transition Assistance Program (TAP) for military spouses in order to provide employment opportunities, training in mental health first aid, and other vital resources. Republicans prevented the House from debating this amendment that could have provided critical economic and community services for the families of those who risk their lives to defend our country.

**Studying the Effects of Tariffs on Small Businesses:** Representative *Derek Tran* (D-CA) proposed amendment #396 to H.R. 1, which would have required the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve, in coordination with the Director of the Office of Financial Research, to conduct a study on the effect of tariffs on small businesses. Americans deserve to know the real-life impact that tariffs are having on their local communities, but Republicans wouldn't even allow a debate.

**Protecting Critical Homebuilding Materials from Tariffs:** Amendment #92 to the Senate Amendment to H.R. 1, offered by Representative *Steven Horsford* (D-NV) and cosponsored by Representatives *Kennedy* (D-NY) and *Amo* (D-RI), would have exempted critical homebuilding materials from tariffs, including materials like lumber, aluminum, cement, and copper. Rather than allowing a vote on this amendment, Republicans have protected Trump's tariffs at all costs and continue to let them increase housing costs for American families.

**Supporting Workers Who Lose Their Jobs:** Amendment #15 to H.R. 1968, proposed by Representative *Summer Lee* (D-PA), would have struck language that reduces funds for state and local training and employment service programs for workers who lose their jobs. As Republicans oversee a languishing labor market, they are also gutting vital resources to assist American workers and preventing votes on Democratic efforts to reverse those cuts.

E. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *FOOD ACCESS, CHILDREN'S HEALTH, AND EDUCATION*

**Preventing Children from Going Hungry:** Amendment #33 to H.R. 1, offered by Representative *Shontel Brown* (D-OH), would have prevented families with children under the age of 18 from losing vital food assistance through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Supporting American families means ensuring that no children in the United States go hungry. Instead of allowing consideration of this amendment, Republicans decided that ending youth hunger was not even worth debating.

**Strengthening the Child Tax Credit:** Amendment #267 to H.R. 1 offered by Representative *Suzan DelBene* (D-WA) would have made the Child Tax Credit fully refundable and increased the credit amount from \$2,000 per child to \$6,360 for newborns, \$4,320 for children aged one through six, and \$3,600 for children aged six through seventeen. This amendment, if adopted, would have made a significant difference for working- and middle-class families across the country.

**Preventing Children, Seniors, and Veterans from Going Hungry:** Amendment #29 to H.R. 1, offered by Representative *Angie Craig* (D-MN), would have removed provisions from the bill that cut \$313 billion from critical food assistance programs for children, veterans, and seniors. By blocking this simple amendment, Republicans have made it clear that they have no interest in debating how their priority legislation is set to increase hunger in America.

**Restoring Funding for Low-Income Student Employment:** Representative *Emilia Sykes* (D-OH) sponsored amendment #200 to H.R. 5894 (118th Congress). This amendment, cosponsored by Representative *Foushee* (D-NC), would have restored full funding to the Federal Work-Study program. Since 1964, this program has helped millions of low-income students afford higher education through various employment opportunities. By blocking this amendment, Republicans supported sending college students into greater debt or forcing them to forgo higher education opportunities altogether.

**Helping Low-Income Students Achieve Higher Education:** Amendment #130 to the Senate Amendment to H.R. 1, sponsored by Representative *Gabe Amo* (D-RI), would have pegged the maximum Federal Pell Grant amount to the rate of inflation. This reform would maintain the program's value and make higher education more accessible to low-income students, but Republicans prevented it from even coming to the House floor.

## F. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *REPRODUCTIVE CARE*

**Ensuring Access to Reproductive Healthcare for Low-Income Americans:** Amendment #272 to H.R. 5894 (118th Congress), offered by Representative *Kathy Manning* (D-NC) and cosponsored by over 30 other Members, would have increased funding for the Family Planning Program, a federal grant program established under the Public Health Service Act. The amendment sought to restore the program funding to \$286.5 million, similar to the program's budget the year prior. The Family Planning Program is the only federally funded program that offers family planning and sexual healthcare services for low-income Americans.

**Preventing Cuts to Reproductive Care for Veterans:** Representative *Julia Brownley* (D-CA) submitted amendment #3 to H.R. 3944, which was cosponsored by Representative *Dexter* (D-OR). This amendment would have eliminated Republican restrictions in the bill on veterans' access to abortion when the health of the veteran is at risk. Protecting the lives of those who protect us is imperative, yet Republicans prevented this amendment from reaching the floor.

**Preventing Abortion Bans on Veterans:** Amendment #936 to H.R. 3838, sponsored by Representative *Timothy Kennedy* (D-NY) and cosponsored by over 40 other Members, would have prohibited the implementation of the Department of Veterans Affairs' proposed rule to reinstate a near-total ban on abortion care or counseling for veterans and their families. Such a rule would apply to all VA facilities, including those in states where abortion is protected.<sup>23</sup>

## G. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *VETERANS AND SERVICEMEMBERS*

**Protecting Non-U.S. Citizen Veterans from Illegal Deportation:** Amendment #63 to H.R. 3944, sponsored by Representative *Norma Torres* (D-CA), would have prohibited the use of federal funds to deport non-citizen U.S. military veterans

without a fair hearing. This amendment was blocked by House Republicans and never debated.

**Maintaining Funding for the Department of Veterans Affairs:** Amendment #345 to H.R. 1, offered by Representative *Chrissy Houlahan* (D-PA), would have prohibited funds made available by the underlying legislation from being used to reduce, close, or privatize any Department of Veterans Affairs facilities or services, but House Republicans blocked it from consideration.

**Supporting the Transition of Servicemembers to Civilian Life:** Representative *Joe Neguse* (D-CO) submitted amendment #150 to H.R. 8070 (118th Congress), which would have directed the Department of Labor to carry out a five-year grant program to assist the transition of servicemembers to civilian life. The funds allocated in the amendment would have been used for a broad range of supportive programs, such as job recruitment and training.

**Funding Housing for At-Risk Veterans:** Amendment #73 to H.R. 1, submitted by Representative *Steven Horsford* (D-NV), would have created an additional 1% tax on stock buybacks for corporations with over \$10 billion in assets to establish a fund for a veterans' housing program. This amendment would have financed permanent supportive housing, rapid rehousing programs, and mental health wraparound services for homeless and at-risk veterans. By implementing a 1% tax on stock buybacks on ultra-wealthy corporations, we could have provided critical resources to those who risked their lives for our country. House Republicans wouldn't even allow a debate.

**Ensuring Compensation for Combat-Disabled Service Retirees:** A bipartisan amendment, #29 to H.R. 3944, led by Representative *Gus Bilirakis* (R-FL) and cosponsored by over 40 other Members, would have allowed for combat-disabled uniform service retirees with fewer than 20 years of creditable service to concurrently receive, without reduction, veteran's disability compensation and retired pay or combat-related special compensation. In other words, this amendment could have ensured that veterans who became disabled in combat would receive sufficient compensation upon retirement. Even though this was a

Republican-led bipartisan amendment with dozens of cosponsors, Rules Republicans never allowed it to receive a vote on the floor.

#### H. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *EPSTEIN FILES TRANSPARENCY*

##### **Ensuring Transparency by Releasing the Epstein Files:**

Despite his campaign promises, President Trump worked tirelessly, with the help of Republican leadership, to prevent the release of the Epstein files. Blocked amendment #50 to H.R. 3633, offered by Representative *Ro Khanna* (D-CA) would have required the Attorney General to preserve and release any records related to Jeffrey Epstein.

##### **Contempt for Failure to Release the Epstein Files:**

Representative *Robert Garcia* (D-CA) offered amendment #1 to H. Res. 668, which would have deemed the Attorney General in contempt of the U.S. House of Representatives should the Department of Justice fail to fully comply with the subpoena of the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform. This amendment would have held the Department of Justice accountable for willfully hiding the Epstein files from the American people. Republican leadership slow walked this transparency issue until a handful of their rank-and-file joined with Democrats in a discharge petition to require the release of the files.

#### I. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *THE ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES*

##### **Reducing Air Pollution Impacts on Schoolchildren:**

Amendment #411 to H.R. 1, offered by Representative *Mary Gay Scanlon* (D-PA), would have removed language from the bill that repeals and rescinds funds to address air pollution in schools. The Republican legislation gutted funding to protect our children from dangerous levels of air pollution at school.

**Preventing Skyrocketing Electricity Prices:** Amendment #485 to H.R. 1, offered by Representative *Don Beyer* (D-VA), would have prevented the elimination of the electricity investment and

production tax credits. As electricity bills continue to rise at unsustainable rates for American families, Republicans gutted clean energy tax credits that would have kept electricity prices lower. They prioritized the bottom-lines of fossil fuel companies at the expense of middle- and working-class households.

**Ensuring Safe and Healthy Homes:** Representative *Gwen Moore* (D-WI) offered amendment #9 to H.R. 4820 (118th Congress), which would have increased funding by \$2.5 million for the Department of Housing and Urban Development's Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes. This increased funding would have allowed us to make strides in reducing lead exposure in households across our country, ensuring children grow up without toxic exposure.

**Protecting our Water Supply from Dangerous Pollutants:** Offered by Representative *Chris Pappas* (D-NH), amendment #8 to H.R. 7023 (118th Congress) would have required any person who discharged a pollutant pursuant to a Clean Water Act permit to monitor and report discharges of emerging contaminants. It would have also authorized \$20 million annually over five years for grants to publicly owned treatment works to carry out monitoring and reporting activities. Keeping track of water pollutants keeps Americans safe, but Republicans refused to even debate the amendment.

**Funding an Office of Environmental Justice:** Offered by Representative *Nanette Barragán* (D-CA), amendment #62 to H.R. 5893 (118th Congress) would have struck language in the bill that prohibits funding for an Office of Environmental Justice. Pulling funding from this office clearly spotlights Republicans' refusal to acknowledge the dangers of climate change and its disproportionate impact on non-white and low-income communities.

#### J. BLOCKED AMENDMENTS ON *LAW ENFORCEMENT AND PUBLIC SAFETY*

**Investing in Small and Midsize Police Departments:** In a bipartisan effort to increase support for local police departments,

Representative *Josh Gottheimer* (D-NJ) sponsored and Representative Rutherford (R-FL) cosponsored amendment #9 to H.R. 8146 (118th Congress). The amendment would have made critical, targeted investments in small and midsize police departments with fewer than 200 officers, focusing on increased retention and supporting officers' mental health. Rules Republicans blocked the amendment from coming to the floor.

**Investing in the Recruitment and Retention of Police Officers:** Amendment #5 to H.R. 5717 (118th Congress), sponsored by Representative *Greg Landsman* (D-OH), would have added the text of the Enhancing COPS Hiring Program Grants for Local Law Enforcement Act to the underlying bill. This amendment would have allowed funds under the Community Oriented Policing Services grant program to be used to provide bonuses for the recruitment and retention of law enforcement officers.

**Increasing Support for Law Enforcement Mental Health:** Amendment #1 to H.R. 2240, offered by Representative *Laura Gillen* (D-NY), would have required the Attorney General to report to congressional committees on effective strategies to reduce stigma and encourage law enforcement officers to access mental health screening and peer-to-peer counseling. Increasing access to information about mental health resources for law enforcement is critical to the safety of our officers and the communities they serve, but Rules Republicans refused to even allow a debate.

**Blocking Giveaways that Make Gun Violence More Dangerous:** Amendment #52 to H.R. 1, offered by Representative *Maxwell Frost* (D-FL), would have struck the tax cut for gun silencers in the underlying bill. Gun silencers are devices that can be attached to the barrel of a firearm to reduce the noise generated upon firing. Reducing the cost of gun silencers only makes them more accessible to bad actors, increasing the threat to our police officers and our communities alike.

From healthcare access to providing for our veterans, House Republicans have blocked commonsense ideas from even being debated by the broader chamber. Over the last two years, thousands of amendments—submitted by Democrats and Republicans alike—have been blocked by Republican Leadership.

By dramatically restricting amendment debate, Rules Republicans and Speaker Johnson ensure that countless issues that matter to the American people never make it to the House floor.

#### IV. DISTORTING THE ROLE OF THE RULES COMMITTEE

##### A. A RUBBER STAMP FOR THE TRUMP WHITE HOUSE

For years, House Republicans have enabled an unprecedented assault on the rule of law, the separation of powers, and the constitutional authority of the legislative branch. Under Speaker Johnson, that failure has only deepened. Rather than checking a rogue executive, Johnson has weaponized House procedure to shield the Administration, transforming the People's House into a rubber stamp and becoming a willing accomplice to a reckless, authoritarian president.

Lacking the confidence of his own conference, Johnson owes his gavel not to the will of the House but to presidential pressure, and he has repaid that debt with blind loyalty. His speakership has been defined by submission: blocking votes on illegal tariffs, stonewalling transparency on the Epstein Files, and refusing to confront blatant abuses of power. The result is a legacy not of leadership, but of institutional decay—one that subordinates Congress, degrades democracy, and puts presidential obedience ahead of the Constitution and the American people.

For example, Republicans abandoned their job to oversee federal spending while the Trump Administration took steps toward illegal impoundment. As of September 8, 2025, the Trump Administration had illegally canceled or frozen \$410 billion in congressionally appropriated funds.<sup>24</sup> The Administration fired 19 Inspectors General meant to hold rogue administrations accountable,<sup>25</sup> attempted to permanently take down a transparency website until

a federal court ordered it be restored,<sup>26</sup> and decimated independent agencies like the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau.<sup>27</sup>

Despite this systematic undermining of congressional authority by the Executive Branch, House Republicans did not stand up for the Constitution. Instead, they cheered on a rogue Administration, ceding their role as a coequal branch of government and exacerbating the challenges faced by the American people.

Republicans also stood idly by while Trump commandeered the power to impose tariffs—a power the Constitution explicitly delegates to Congress. Then they doubled down, using the Rules Committee to prevent the House from even debating or voting on the tariffs on the House floor. Since March, Republicans have adopted four rules to block the House from voting to end President Trump's tariffs on Canada, Mexico, and Brazil, as well as his global tariffs.<sup>28, 29</sup> This blockade has been extended through January 31, 2026.<sup>30, 31</sup> Under Speaker Johnson's leadership, the House has abdicated its constitutional duty to debate and vote on Trump's reckless tariffs that are raising prices on millions of families, straining American businesses, and threatening relationships with allies abroad.

Republican Leadership's commitment to transparency proved hollow when calls to release the Epstein Files came to the forefront. On the campaign trail, Trump promised voters he would release the Files—over 100,000 Department of Justice (DOJ) documents related to convicted child sex trafficker Jeffrey Epstein and other elites within Epstein's inner circle. In February 2025, Trump's Attorney General said Epstein's client list was sitting on her desk.<sup>32</sup> Reportedly, in May, the Attorney General informed Trump that his name appears in the Epstein Files.<sup>33</sup> Then, on July 7, the DOJ and FBI released an unsigned memo attempting to sweep the issue under the rug.<sup>34</sup>

This complete reversal from the Administration drew concerns from the public and Democratic and Republican Members of Congress alike. Rules Democrats offered multiple motions to allow the full House to debate the issue and seek answers for the sake of transparency, accountability, and to support the survivors. Representatives Massie (R-KY) and Khanna (D-CA) worked on a bipartisan basis to introduce H.R. 4405, the Epstein Files Transparency Act, which would require the Administration to release all the Files while also ensuring protection of the survivors.

In an effort to block the Massie-Khanna bill, Rules Republicans and Speaker Johnson cooked up their own Epstein-related policy—a non-binding resolution with no force of law—and moved it forward in a rule on July 17.<sup>35</sup> When Rules Democrats asked their Republican counterparts when this rule would be brought to the floor, Republicans had no answers. The rule was never called up on the floor and instead was tabled in a later rule.<sup>36</sup> The resolution's true purpose was to provide Rules Republicans enough cover while following the Administration's lead in burying the Files.

The following week, when Rules Democrats once again made it clear during a meeting on July 21 that they would make motions to send the Massie-Khanna bill to the House floor, Rules Republicans recessed the Committee indefinitely, reportedly afraid to take more votes on releasing Epstein Files.<sup>37</sup> With the Rules Committee frozen thanks to Republicans' fealty to the president, Speaker Johnson sent the House of Representatives to August recess early.<sup>38</sup>

In an effort to bypass Rules Republicans and Speaker Johnson's blockade, Representatives Massie and Khanna began collecting signatures on a discharge petition. Throughout October, Speaker Johnson repeatedly delayed the swearing in of a newly elected member—likely out of fear that she would become the deciding signature on the discharge petition.<sup>39</sup> The Speaker's stalling tactic relied on keeping the House out of session for the duration of the government shutdown, ignoring his prior precedent of swearing in

members during a pro forma session. This extraordinary abuse of power was a disgrace to the People’s House.

During his first speech as Speaker, Johnson said his office is “going to be known for trust and transparency and accountability... for the honesty, integrity that is incumbent upon us, all of us, here in the People’s House.”<sup>40</sup> Disappointingly, the Speaker has abandoned these promises and instead has worked tirelessly to protect President Trump and stymie efforts to release the Epstein Files. Despite Johnson’s stonewalling, however, a handful of Republicans alongside the entire Democratic Caucus successfully utilized the discharge petition process—forcing the Epstein Files Transparency Act to the House floor, where it passed 427-1.<sup>41</sup> After it unanimously passed the Senate, President Trump signed it into law.<sup>42</sup> Unfortunately, when the deadline to release the Files came on December 19, the Trump Administration slow-walked the release and ultimately failed to comply with the law.<sup>43</sup>

Given Speaker Johnson’s complete abdication of the People’s House to the rogue Administration, it is perhaps no surprise that the two-year anniversary of his speakership occurred during the longest government shutdown in history.

Speaker Johnson refused to work to reopen the government for over 40 days. He refused to bring the House back into session, marking the only time in the last five decades that the House has left Washington for over 40 days outside of the summer district work period and campaign season.<sup>44</sup> According to one House Republican from California, keeping the House out throughout the shutdown was “embarrassing.”<sup>45</sup>

From healthcare to the affordability of groceries, the American people are facing immense crises—yet Speaker Johnson refused to let the House do its work. Weeks into the shutdown, President Trump remarked that he is both “the speaker and the president.”<sup>46</sup> In line with his actions throughout the 119th Congress, Speaker Johnson’s cancelation of 5 weeks of legislative business during the

government shutdown illustrates his role as President Trump's puppet.

## B. A SPEAKER FOR THE BILLIONAIRE ELITE

The 118th Congress was one of the least productive in decades.<sup>47</sup> The historic abdication of governance by congressional Republicans flew in the face of the many pressing needs of the American people. They have spent their time in power passing tax breaks for billionaires, loopholes for special interests, and giveaways to greedy corporations and those at the top.

Despite the United States reaching record levels of wealth and income inequality in recent years, Republicans' top priority in the 119th Congress was to further rig our economy and make devastating cuts to healthcare and food assistance programs through their so-called "One Big Beautiful Bill" (H.R. 1).

Despite its title, this bill, now law, is nowhere close to being beautiful for regular people—and the facts speak for themselves. The top 20% of earners in America will get roughly 60% of the tax cuts included in H.R. 1.<sup>48</sup> People making over a million dollars will receive a tax break of over \$100,000 per year while those earning less than \$50,000 will receive a tax cut of less than \$1 per day beginning in 2027 when the law goes into effect.<sup>49</sup> Their law will deliver \$1 trillion in tax cuts for the richest 1% over the next 10 years, while cutting Medicaid and the Affordable Care Act by a similar sum.<sup>50, 51</sup> Due to the draconian cuts to Medicaid and food assistance, the largest in American history, households in the bottom income decile will lose roughly \$1,200 per year.<sup>52</sup> Not only will working- and middle-class Americans see little tax benefit and lose healthcare and food assistance, but they will also miss out on

the 760,000 manufacturing and energy jobs that are estimated to be eliminated by this law.<sup>53</sup>

Democrats fought against these tax breaks for the ultra-wealthy, offering an amendment to prevent tax cuts for people making over \$400,000 annually; Rules Republicans and Speaker Johnson blocked debating it on the floor.<sup>54</sup> Democrats offered an amendment to prevent tax cuts for those making over \$10 million per year; Republicans blocked it.<sup>55</sup> Democrats offered an amendment to establish a higher tax bracket for those making over \$1 billion; Republicans blocked it.<sup>56</sup> In the 119th Congress thus far, Rules Republicans have voted against dozens of motions that would have allowed the full chamber to debate amendments promoting economic equality.<sup>57</sup>

The cuts to Medicaid, the added red tape in H.R. 1, and the expiration of the enhanced ACA healthcare premium tax credits will result in 15 million Americans getting kicked off health insurance. Republicans' Medicaid cuts alone are estimated to take healthcare access away from 10 million people once they come into effect.<sup>58</sup> However, congressional Republicans ensured their Medicaid cuts would come into force mere months after the 2026 midterms in an attempt to avoid an electoral backlash, an implicit admission that their cuts will be deeply unpopular with the American people.<sup>59</sup>

House Republicans also forced the longest government shutdown in American history rather than negotiate to protect healthcare for millions of Americans despite months of warnings that a healthcare cliff was coming. Even as premiums were set to skyrocket and the Congressional Budget Office warned that delays would cost over a million people their coverage, Republican Leadership refused to act. 78% percent of Americans support extending the Affordable Care Act's enhanced premium tax credits, yet Republicans blocked debate, shuttered the House, and

ultimately returned only to pass legislation that cut healthcare for a hundred thousand more.<sup>60, 61</sup>

That same indifference defined their approach to hunger. Republicans slashed SNAP to help finance tax cuts for the ultra-wealthy, pushing millions of families closer to food insecurity—including children, seniors, veterans, and Americans with disabilities. Even after Republican leaders themselves warned of a looming hunger crisis, Speaker Johnson refused to bring the House back to Washington or allow debate on legislative fixes. In the richest country in the world, House Republicans chose billionaire tax breaks over healthcare and food assistance for working families, rigging the system even further in favor of those already at the top.

## V. THE IMPACTS OF SPEAKER JOHNSON'S HEAVY-HANDED LEADERSHIP

### A. ON THE PEOPLE'S HOUSE

Over the last two years, Speaker Johnson's top-down approach to leadership has shut down critical debate, degraded the People's House, and all but guaranteed that our economy works for the ultra-wealthy at the expense of hardworking Americans.

Speaker Johnson and House Republicans have turned Congress into a rubber stamp for a president who has no respect for America's governing institutions. Patriotism means respecting our institutions even when they empower voices we disagree with. It requires commitment to the deliberative process.

The first year of the 119th Congress turbocharged Speaker Johnson's legacy of institutional decline. It earned the unflattering record of the fewest House votes in the first year of a two-year Congress in over three and a half decades.<sup>62</sup> The result of Johnson sidelining the People's House? The fewest measures signed into law



in the first year of a presidency in over 35 years.<sup>63</sup> This historic abdication of governance in the House has come at the expense of ideas from all across the country.



The above map shows all the districts whose representatives have had at least one amendment blocked by the Rules Committee during Speaker Johnson's tenure. These districts account for over 250 million people who deserve to have their diverse interests represented in the federal government, just as this institution was designed.

Vast swaths of the country are being left behind due to Republicans' lockdown on debate in the People's House: Representatives from nearly three-quarters of the country have been blocked from calling up their ideas on the House floor. Over time, this blockade weakens the institutional integrity of Congress as it is unable to represent the ideas and needs of millions of Americans.

Rules Democrats are fighting to revitalize Congress because it is an essential first step toward building a government that represents the majority of Americans instead of millionaires and billionaires.

## B. ON THE AMERICAN PEOPLE

Speaker Johnson's two years with the gavel have been incredibly harmful to the well-being of the American people. The Rules Committee agenda these past two years has been filled with billionaire-backed handouts to corporate America and failed messaging bills that demonize minorities.

At the end of the 118th Congress, Rules Democrats urged the 119th Congress to make:

*"...meaningful progress to lower costs for American families, protect Medicare, Medicaid, and Social Security, and uplift working people through policies that strengthen the middle class, invest in workers, and provide a lifeline for families living paycheck to paycheck or struggling to get ahead."*<sup>64</sup>

The first year of this Congress has shown that House Republicans, under Speaker Johnson, have no interest in heeding our call. H.R. 1, their top priority for this Congress, speeds up the timeline for both Medicare and Social Security to become insolvent.<sup>65, 66</sup> Fearing the electoral backlash, House Republicans wrote H.R. 1 to cut healthcare access through Medicaid and the Affordable Care Act for over 10 million people months after the 2026 midterms.<sup>67</sup> Republicans shut down the government in their crusade to cut healthcare for roughly 5 million more Americans. By the time the House left for the year, Republicans had blocked dozens of attempts to extend the ACA tax credits, pushing millions of Americans over the healthcare cliff.

Under Republican control, the job market has stagnated, and Trump's tariffs have kept inflation elevated and raised prices on household goods on which millions of Americans rely every day. The American people are struggling to navigate a treacherous affordability crisis. Yet, the Republican agenda week to week either ignores the issue of affordability or actively makes it worse. The Republicans' biggest "accomplishment" this Congress thus far cuts taxes for the wealthiest Americans while gutting SNAP, Medicaid,

and other vital government programs. It has been described as “the largest one-time upward redistribution of income in U.S. history.”<sup>68</sup>

House Republicans have broken the trust of the American people as they have been more intent on catering to Trump and their billionaire backers than the communities they are elected to serve. When healthcare costs were set to double or triple for millions of working- and middle-class Americans, Republicans refused to act.

Hardworking Americans get up every day, determined to provide for themselves, their families, and loved ones; Republican Leadership gets up every day focused on how they can further rig the economy against those same hardworking Americans. The American people deserve better than Republican Leadership that shuts down debate on important issues. They deserve better than a Congress that prioritizes handouts to those already on top at the expense of food access and healthcare for millions working hard to make ends meet.

## VI. RESTORING CONGRESS: OF, BY, AND FOR THE PEOPLE

The House of Representatives is a central pillar of our democratic republic. When debate is shut down and stifled, it is the American people who suffer.

Speaker Johnson has led the most closed Congresses in history, turned the House of Representatives into a rubber stamp for a dangerous Administration, and has turbocharged efforts to exploit the working class at the behest of those at the very top.

The contrast between Democratic and Republican priorities illustrated by the sample of blocked amendments detailed above could not be more distinct. While House Republicans have worked incessantly to further rig our system in favor of the few, Democrats have stood up for lower prices, better healthcare, safer communities, and an economy that works for everyone.

Just as importantly, we believe that solving our complex challenges as a nation requires a functioning Congress. We believe Congress must be restored as a forum for real deliberation—where

good ideas are debated and voted on, and Members of Congress feel empowered to represent their constituents. The record could not be clearer: Democrats have fought to protect healthcare, lower costs, expand opportunity, and build an economy that works for all. Republicans have worked tirelessly to block those efforts every turn.

The Rules Committee should serve the people, not Donald Trump, and certainly not the rich, powerful donors he surrounds himself with. The stakes are too high for obstruction and silence. The American people are counting on Congress to do its job and there is no time left to waste.
